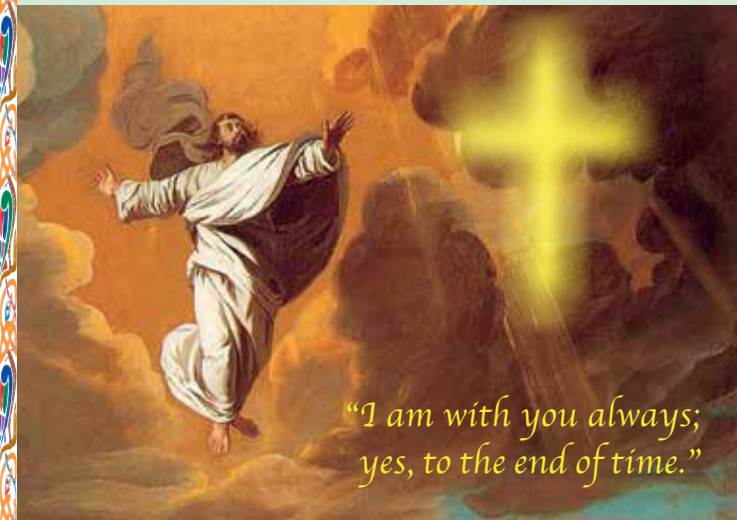




focus on sunday

I know some people whose work is never finished. They always seem to have something more to do – more tidying the house, more cleaning, more office work brought home. Sometimes we long for the day St John Newman talks of: ‘when our work is done’. Jesus was something like that. He says that ‘the work you gave me is finished’ and ascended to heaven. But the gospel around Ascension time shows that it is not finished. He will be with us all days, still helping, consoling, and the centre of our faith community.

Another way of the unfinished work is that he prays for us: he will pray for his apostles and later for ‘all those who will believe through their work’. We are constantly in his thoughts and prayers, the one who is our lifelong companion.

Prayer is a work of Jesus now, and of the church. The apostles prayed after his going to his Father with Mary and several others. In bad times we have turned to prayer in confusion, almost going off the path of trusting in God. As we await the coming of the Spirit, we value prayer, the gift of the Spirit to us. If we have taught anyone to pray, or helped them to pray, we have given a great gift, as prayer is one of the sources of life of God and our neighbour.

A reading from the letter of St. Paul to the Ephesians

* I, the prisoner in the Lord, implore you to lead a life worthy of your vocation. Bear with one another charitably, in complete selflessness, gentleness and patience. Do all you can to preserve the unity of the Spirit by the peace that binds you together. There is one Body, one Spirit, just as you were all called into one and the same hope when you were called. There is one Lord, one faith, one baptism, and one God who is Father of all, over all, through all and within all.

Each one of us, however, has been given his own share of grace, given as Christ allotted it.* It was said that he would:

When he ascended to the height, he captured prisoners, he gave gifts to men.

When it says, ‘he ascended’, what can it mean if not that he descended right down to the lower regions of the earth? The one who rose higher than all the heavens to fill all things is none other than the one who descended. LITURGY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING Acts 1: 1-11

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

In my earlier work, Theophilus, I dealt with everything Jesus had done and taught from the beginning until the day he gave his instructions to the apostles he had chosen through the Holy Spirit, and was taken up to heaven. He had shown himself alive to them after his Passion by many demonstrations: for forty days he had continued to appear to them and tell them about the kingdom of God. When he had been at table with them, he had told them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for what the Father had promised. ‘It is’ he had said ‘what you have heard me speak about: John baptised with water but you, not many days from now, will be baptised with the Holy Spirit.’

Now having met together, they asked him, ‘Lord, has the time come? Are you going to restore the kingdom to Israel?’ He replied, ‘It is not for you to know times or dates that the Father has decided by his own authority, but you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you, and then you will be my witnesses not only in Jerusalem but throughout Judaea and Samaria, and indeed to the ends of the earth.’
